
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A Passion to Serve




Ahesh Harilela attended King George V School (KGV) from 1975 to 1981 and has been the Chairman of the school's Strategic Development Committee since January 2009. Here, we talk to him about his schooldays; his passion for business and serving the community and about the important work undertaken by the Committee.

A Story of Success

Mr Harilela's family has deep and enduring links with Hong Kong and KGV. The family moved from India to China and then to Hong Kong. It's a rags to riches story. Several generations of his family were educated at the school and his three daughters are all current or former KGVers.

Just as Hong Kong has faced many challenges and changes, so too must KGV adapt to changing local and global circumstances, according to Mr Harilela. "Education is a constantly changing and evolving paradigm and ESF has managed that very well. Since I was at school, there have been huge changes in the education process and the curriculum. We now have to balance academic studies with the arts and sport."

The school's ability to adapt is evidenced by its success in switching from GCE A-levels to the IB system in just two years. When asked about the most important value that KGV instills in its students, Mr Harilela has no hesitation in citing community spirit. "Earlier this year there was a charity



drive to raise funds for orphanages. This is one of many outreach projects students undertake that engage with society - not only in Hong Kong but globally. The students create their own charitable organisations. They know they're privileged and they want to give back. The school nurtures and encourages that."

Hardware and Software

The Strategic Development Committee is all about hardware and software, said Mr Harilela. "The hardware is the buildings and the facilities. There will be two new blocks costing HK\$420 million (HK\$252 million funded by ESF) and we're aiming to create a worldclass Learning Resource Centre for current students. That will cost HK\$35 million. We're also planning a HK\$100 million indoor stadium and swimming pool. We're developing a fundraising strategy with our Community Development Manager, Ruth Barnes. This is something neither we, nor ESF have never done before."

"On the software side, it's all about the human touch. In February 2011 we held a community discussion with students and parents so they could share their thoughts about issues the school needed to address. Ed Wickins, the Principal, has done a good job of creating a community spirit that enables everyone to participate."

The Committee is also planning to establish a scholarship for worthy

students. "Some kids are academically capable but don't have the financial resources to pursue their academic and career goals in other countries. Overseas scholarships are highly competitive so we hope to create our own that will enable a graduating student to receive a grant towards their tertiary education."

A Greener Future

As for his varied business interests, Mr Harilela describes himself as "a treehugger without hugging trees." After studying and working in the US, he returned to Hong Kong in 2007 and built and sold a successful company. In 2009, he and a friend launched a new business to import Hawaiian Spring water into Hong Kong in partnership with the French actor Jean Reno.

Determined to be socially responsible, the company collects empty plastic water bottles and recycles the PET plastic. "It's converted into yarn and made into fabric for promotional gifts for various brands. We've also expanded into recycling rice husks and straw waste to make drinking cups. I've created a fund that invests in new bio-diverse technologies, for example taking agricultural waste and converting it into other products."

Giving Back

That sense of social responsibility carries over into Mr Harilela's volunteer work as Chairman of the Strategic Development Committee. "Hong Kong has been good to my family. We've enjoyed many privileges, so what I've always wanted to do is participate in giving back to KGV. It's a great school, and I have very positive memories of my time there as a student."

"Some of the students and teachers I knew back then are still my friends to




this day. I encourage everyone to give back. It's not just about money; it's about giving your time and trying to make a difference. And it's not about the individual; it's a collective effort."


Calling All Alumni

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Building a Career



bigail Tam knew from an early age that she wanted to be an architect and at 35 she still finds it a rewarding career. It hasn't always been easy however. Ms Tam has fought successfully to prove herself in a world where the 'glass ceiling' has restricted opportunities for women to gain promotion in traditionally male career areas.

A Blooming Architect

"It's very tough being female in this industry," said Ms Tam. "Men have certain expectations. They assume that women don't want to work on muddy construction sites so you constantly have to prove yourself. Gradually though, more female architects are coming into the industry and breaking down these outdated perceptions and stereotypes."

"I currently work at the Kai Tak cruise terminal site. It's a challenging job. I've been working here for half a year and my role is to manage all the architectural issues. I previously worked ated from Sha Tin College in 1994 en attended University of Newcastle and sity College London

in architectural consultancy for 10 years but I recently went over to the 'dark side,' as architects say. Now I'm learning what it's like to be on the front line of the construction industry."

Ms Tam was born in Toronto but came to Hong Kong when she was five years old. She went to Beacon Hill Primary School and then attended Sha Tin College from 1987 to 1994.

"From year nine onwards I knew that I wanted to be an architect. It was always something that I felt inspired by. It all began in the CDT class that's Craft, Design and Technology. I was sure I had the talent in terms of drawing and being able to perceive things architecturally."









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Ms Tam studied maths, geography and graphical communication for her 'A' levels before heading to the University of Newcastle to study for a degree in architectural studies. She describes this as 'part one' of her architecture academic training. She returned to Hong Kong for a year of work experience before going back to the UK to continue her architectural studies – which she describes as part two – at University College London. She completed her course in 2001.

Ms Tam worked in the UK for a further four years and qualified as an architect. She returned to Hong Kong in 2005 and currently works for a French contractor, Dragages.



The two teachers who inspired this budding architect at Sha Tin College were Marshall Hughes and John Brennan. "They made me see things in a different way and they were great teachers. They opened my eyes to the use of perspective – seeing things in 3D. Not everyone has an eye for that. When I talk to you about architecture you may not be able to visualise something in 3D. I'm able to, thanks to Marshall and John."

A Devoted Volunteer

Links with Sha Tin College remain strong for Ms Tam. She is a member of the School Council. "While on the School Council, one of my tasks has been to start a Sha Tin College alumni group, as that is something we've lacked in the past. We're in the process of setting up the official Sha Tin College website. It's a community for alumni and former teachers to keep in touch," she explains

In 2014, it will be 20 years since Ms Tam left the college and she's already preparing a reunion event for her fellow alumni and teachers. "We're planning to include a ball and lots of other events. It will be a one-week programme and I've still got plenty of time to plan!"

Her connections with the college are not restricted to meeting up with old schoolmates however. Ms Tam and other members of the Council are keen to share their knowledge by offering career advice to help students decide on future studies and career paths.



The Next Generation

When Ms Tam was at Sha Tin College, it still had a relatively small student population. In year 12 and 13, she recalls there was a maximum of 40 students in each year group. She remembers the teachers being conscientious and caring. One of the advantages of attending an international school is that "these days I can communicate with almost anyone. I'm not shy." "It's important that the alumni community help the current students at Sha Tin College. For example, we get involved in mentoring. At higher education evenings we arrange for a number of alumni to talk to students about careers in architecture, medicine and so on."

There were only a few computers at Sha Tin College when Ms Tam studied there - a far cry from the computeroriented classrooms of today. But she also feels that students need to improve their interaction skills

> instead of finding their answers electronically. "They don't ask enough questions," she says. "They're too quick to look things up on Google which means they don't talk to one another. Students can also be quite spoilt these days and are often not ready to go out into the workforce."

Ms Tam has been mentoring two students at her office, where they can learn about being an architect and see if it is a career for them. She's keen to see students make the right choices for themselves, and not make decisions based on pressure from parents or their peers.

"I keep emphasising to the kids: It's your life - just make sure you do something you like."

A New Page

yron Lam achieved a maximum 45 points in his International Baccalaureate (IB) this summer and he's looking forward to heading to Brown University in Rhode Island in the United States to continue his studies.

Myron is proof that you can get excellent grades and still maintain a healthy balance of school work and extra-curricular activities. What might surprise many people is that Myron only has a vague idea of what he would like to do in the future and his parents don't mind.

Follow Your Heart

Myron has always been allowed to follow his own interests and make his own decisions in life. "My parents are really against the idea of telling me which profession I should go into," he said. "They want me to explore for myself. I'm really grateful for that. I think that's a little different from other traditional Chinese parents."

This relaxed attitude stands in contrast to Tiger Mothers, exemplified by US

author Amy Chua, who would be horrified if their children didn't have a clear career path already mapped out.

"I've been thinking at this point about maybe doing something with business, but also with the media or even acting. So I'll have to see how it turns out at Brown."

The budding actor from Island School chose Brown because of its open curriculum and reputation as a 'happy school.' "Brown really allows you to explore the things that you want. So I can go on to study subjects that I've never touched before."

"To succeed in the IB you have to be good at juggling. For me the hard part wasn't the content but rather the quantity of the work. It was juggling the six subjects and extended essay, plus college essays for admissions and extra-curricular activities. I had to get my priorities right."

"You may have some nights with a little less sleep," he says, but you will pull through.

School Life at Island School

At higher level, Myron studied economics, geography and Chinese and at standard level, biology, maths and English. His favourite subject is economics "because you take real life issues and you actually think about them from a theoretical perspective. I like the idea of trying to look at a reallife problem, finding solutions and then evaluating those solutions and thinking why they might not work."

For his CAS (Creativity, Action, Service) section of the IB, Myron turned first to his passion for acting and last year achieved a grade 8 for drama from the London Academy of Music and Performing Arts. He also participated in speech festivals. He doesn't class himself as a particularly athletic person so the 'Action' part of CAS was good for his health!

While he didn't feel he was fit enough for the Standard Chartered Hong Kong Marathon, he and some friends trained for the 10 km event. "We relied on self-discipline as we had to get up early on Saturday mornings and train. We pushed one another."

For 'Service,' Myron travelled to both China and Cambodia with his church to carry out community activities. He also started the Island School Anti-Drug Action Group.

A New Page

Currently Myron is enjoying the prospect of stretching his mind and finding out about new subjects. He enjoys acting but may choose instead to set up his own business with a focus on the community.



A year ago he went to Brown University for a course called *Changing Business – Becoming a Social Entrepreneur*. The course provided him with the opportunity to meet many social entrepreneurs in the United States.




"Brown really allows you to explore the things that you want. So I can go on to explore other subjects that I've never touched before."

Myron wants us all to think more carefully about the products we consume. He gives the example of a coffee firm that uses Fair Trade coffee beans and ensures that its workers are not exploited. Part of the revenue is donated to charity and their cups are biodegradable, a business that can give something back to society.


